### Happy New Year Falcon Families!





A <u>Black</u> <u>church</u> leader and a son of early civil rights activist and minister <u>Martin Luther King Sr.</u>, King advanced <u>civil rights</u> for <u>people of color</u> in the United States through the use of <u>nonviolent resistance</u> and <u>nonviolent civil disobedience</u> against <u>Jim Crow laws</u> and other forms of <u>discrimination in the United States</u>.




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# Families of current SJCSD 5th graders,

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#### School Culture and Expectations - Please read

Expectations meetings for second semester have been held with **6th grade** and **7th grade** students. Freedom Crossing Academy is dedicated towards increasing positive student behavioral outcomes and fostering positive relationships. Parents, please talk to your student about our FCA School Culture and the recent Expectations Meetings. Inquire about Good News shared and the Class Social Contract. I also implore parents to talk about appropriate behavior including how students treat and talk to each other, especially when in non-structured environments like lunch and recess.

It is expected that students understand that any conduct or behavior that demeans, degrades, antagonizes, humiliates or embarrasses a person or group of persons, including racial slurs or derogatory comments is unacceptable and our outlined in our student code of conduct as a Level II and Level III offense. FCA does not take these behaviors lightly and will follow the SJCSD Student Code of Conduct 23-24.

#### Taking care of our school community-HOW CAN PARENTS HELP?

We are very proud of our PBIS Gold status, and our teachers do an exemplary job implementing PBIS practices in the classroom. We are working on teaching our students to self-regulate behaviors in non-structured environments like lunch, recess and on the bus, but we need your help.

We encourage parents to talk to their children about the words they use with peers and keeping their hands to themselves. With these behaviors we do give age-appropriate consequences, per the St. Johns County School District Student Code of Conduct. Thank you for your support of this request.

#### Cell Phone/Technology Policy


Students may possess cellular telephones and other wireless communication devices at school, on and at school functions. However, they must be turned off, stored in student's backpack, purse, locker. The device shall not be used during the school day without administrative approval or on school buses to and from school. Students may not use a wireless communication device during instructional timeexcept when expressly directed by a teacher solely for educational purposes. Failure to comply may

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Arrival and Dismissal

We appreciate your help in getting your students to school on time. Please be mindful that students that arrive after 8:00AM are tardy and missing valuable class time. Additionally, we are so thankful to have our amazing Patrols on duty each morning and afternoon. Please know that patrols and staff members will begin unloading students at 7:40AM.

A few things that can help us move the car lines and keep everyone safe.

In the morning:

• For safety, always exist on the right passenger side of the vehicle.

- · Remind students to walk on the right side of the sidewalk.
- · Students backpacks and items should be ready to grab upon exit.
- · Staff and patrols will assist with younger students exiting the vehicles.
- Please pull all the way up and follow the directions of staff directing cars.
- Please be mindful of cell phone use during this time.

• No cars should pull into the bus loop for any reason. Drop Off and Pickup should be in the Parent/Pickup and Drop Off location in the front of the school.

#### In afternoon:

• School Crossing Guards will be posted at Longleaf and Shetland Dr. from 7:25AM to 8:00AM and in the afternoon 2:23PM to 2:53PM. It has been brought to our attention that students are crossing to the school before the PSAs/Crossing Guards take their posts and not making not making use of the Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon.

• Kindergarten and 1st grade Biker/Walkers must be picked up by a parents, guardian or sibling and should have a red lanyard to show staff members.

· Biker and Walkers should ONLY cross where there is a Crossing Guard. Please talk to your older children about this safety concern.

· Bikers should always wear a helmet for safety.

• When in the Parent Pickup line, please pull all the way up even if the cone number called does not match up. This is improving the efficiency of our lines.



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#### Safety - Required Drills

Below is a list of required drills to be held throughput the school year for the safety of our students, we do not advertise the dates and times of the drills. Teachers are notified to help prepare students. If you happen to get caught in a drill when arriving or picking up, we will be sure to include you in the safety protocols and ask for your patience during this time.

#### **Required Drills:**

- 1 fire drill with in the 1st 10 days of school
- 1 fire drill per month w/2 occurring within the first 30 days of school
- 1 active assailant drill per month
- 1 bomb/evacuation drill per semester
- 1 tornado/weather drill per semester
- 2 bus evacuation drills
